

# NDP insurance loans revealed

 \$80,000 an acre for land it bought in Matsqui.  
 Anderson also complained Friday that the insurance company plans to go ahead with its purchase of more than 20 acres of Richmond agricultural land affected by the farmland freeze.  
 The Province first revealed three weeks ago that the ICBC had signed an interim agreement for the land with-

out making it conditional on such things as rezoning.  
 Richmond council already has turned down an application by the ICBC to have the land rezoned and Anderson said Friday that the government's environment and land use committee also has turned down a request by the insurance corporation to have the land lifted from the farmland freeze.  
 "This Richmond thing shows really good business sense," Anderson said. "Now it looks like the insurance cor-

poration is going into the farming business as well. No wonder they bought out the nearly bankrupt Kelowna insurance firm (Fruit Growers Mutual)."  
 Anderson further charged that both the government and its insurance company have launched a brainwashing campaign about the insurance scheme.  
 "First they tried to tell us that startup costs would be low and now they are hinting all the time that this is going to be a difficult task. This lat-

ter talk is just to get the public ready for the day they give us some costs."  
 "The other thing they're doing is trying to condition the good drivers — those without driving accidents etc. for, say, 10 to 15 years — that they will have to pay the same costs as the poor drivers."  
 "That's the trouble with socialists. They try to make everyone equal even though everyone is different."  
 Anderson accused Premier Barrett of "continuing the Bennett era" through the use of orders-in-council.  
 "They passed this latest loan less than a week after the fall session of the legislature and even after the NDP convention so that no one could ask any questions. Some 'open government' this bunch is."

## 'Lost and found' Police cop cash

NEW YORK (NYT) — A New York City police department experiment found that, of 51 patrolmen handed "lost" wallets containing \$20 or more by strangers and asked to turn them in, 15 officers apparently kept the money without making a report.  
 The random survey, part of the department's effort to gauge the effect of its campaign against malfeasance, was conducted by the undercover Internal Affairs Division.  
 Inspector John Guido, the commander of the force's anti-corruption unit, said that only two patrolmen admitted later that they had kept the money. Others said they had mislaid them, that they had dropped them in a mailbox, or they could not recall receiving them. All have been served with departmental charges.  
 Each of the wallets handed to the patrolmen had a name and address inside. Three of the wallets contained \$250; the rest had amounts varying from \$20 to \$32.  
 Most of the 36 cases in which the wallet and money was returned — including all three containing \$250 — followed prescribed procedure. One officer, at his own expense, mailed the wallet and money to the address inside.

 scription of expatriates who had sought refuge in Allende's Chile as "riff raff of the Latin American Left."  
 The New Democrat MP charged the Canadian government is doing little or nothing to help those whose political views do not coincide with those of the military Chilean government, but would have done much more if the views held were right wing.  
 Harney asked Sharp whether it was true the Canadian embassy in Santiago was told to provide asylum only if the would-be refugees were being

pursued by armed police. The minister answered vaguely in the Commons but later confirmed to newsmen that all Canadian embassies around the world are instructed to allow entrance only to those asylum-seekers "if in danger of being killed."  
 Repeating to charges from Harney that Canada is doing less to help Chilean refugees wanting to come here than it did for Hungarian, Czechoslovak, Tibetan, and Ugandan refugees, Sharp announced that a Canadian immigration officer is to arrive in Panama next Monday and that a special team will also visit Honduras, Costa Rica, and Chile,

to see how many Chilean refugees want to come to Canada.  
 Harney said he has more diplomatic cables in his possession and will release them next week, if he can protect the source of the leak. "They're out for his neck," he said, referring to the investigation under way by the department to discover the culprit.  
 The leakage occurred at the Ottawa end and not at the Santiago embassy.  
 In Vancouver, Chile protest spokesman Steve Penner said the government stand is still inadequate and normal immigration procedures are being used instead of treating the applicants as political refugees.

 Police said the latest threat to Paul Getty III, 17, was in a four-line typewritten letter. It came only hours after actress Gail Harris, Getty's mother, received answers to five questions which proved to her satisfaction her son still is alive.
