Old steam locomotive starts second career

"Do you think it will go?" asked Recreation Minister Jack Radford as he looked member the days when No. 3716 was the at the hissing fron horse.

"It will go all right," Premier Dave Barrett answered him. "It's like our government. You just have to kick it once in

Barrett and Radford stood back to let Labor Minister Bill King climb aboard steam locomotive No. 3716, which was building up steam on the CP Rail tracks in

The ministerial trio, generating a curious mixture of historical respect and sheer boyishness, were presiding over the debut of the old steam engine Tuesday.

The locomotive, a relic from a more romantic railway era, was retired for permanent exhibition in Port Coquitlam several years ago, but it began to deteriorate. Last year, the city offered the steam engine to the province for a token \$1, so it

could be restored. After refurbishing it at the CP Rail oundhouse, the government decided that Port Coquitlam residents should be the first to view it.

The locomotive, pulling about five pas-senger cars including the personal rail car used by former premier W. A. C. Bennett, took about an hour to make the run from Vancouver to Port Coquitlam.

Waiting at the old Port Coquitlam station were about 300 people, city officials, passenger travel.

During a brief ceremony, Barrett formally transferred the locomotive to the department of recreation. The department will make it available to the B.C. provincial museum, which plans to use it to pull a rolling stock museum.

The travelling museum, which will have the History of Steam in B.C. as its theme, will be put on display in Burnaby and then circulated throughout the province. When completed, the museum will con-

sist of the locomotive and tender, a water car, boxcar, two flatcars each with live steam machinery, two exhibition coaches, a theatre coach and a crew accommodation car. Cost of the entire project, including op-

Most Kamloops body shops reported closed by strike

KAMLOOPS - A spokesman for auto body shops here said Tuesday that most of them are closed or are operating with skeleton staffs as a result of the strike of Insurance Corporation of B.C. office work-

Angus Currie, president of Eveready Mercury Sales, estimated that each of the 20 Kamloops body shops will lose \$10,000 per month for the duration of the strike by Office and Technical Employees' Union

"Most of the body shops are shut completely or are operating with only one or two people," he said in an interview. "Those that are still open are rapidly run-

He said the body shops will remain "neutral" in the dispute and will not do any work for ICBC. Body shops that have co-operated with ICBC during the strike have been picketed by OTEU members.

"We're desperately hoping the strike will be settled because the financial strains are severe," Currie added.
